Remembering Our Jack



Recently we lost one of our Life Members, Jack Arney. Jack was born in Adelaide on 11th August 1925. After Matriculating from Mildura High School in 1942 he joined the Department of Education as a student teacher.

Jack turned 18 in 1943 and, along with a number of his peers, he joined up in the RAAF on 18th March 1944. He was selected to be trained as "fighter Pilot", but as he was only 18 years old, his parents could refuse permission -for this they did. Instead, he entered the RADAR, a secret service system charged with detecting direction and range of moving & fixed objects.

Jack then served as a "Leading Aircraftsman" (LAC) attached to various Mobile Fighter Control Units.

In 1945 he was flown to Adelaide then on to Sydney before he joined forces with 800 odd troops in Queensland, to embark on a U.S Liberty Ship to Milne Bay - a small island off West Papua. Unaware of their destination, they embarked on H.M.A.S Westralia and took part in the landing Tarakan, under continuous bombing, strafing and gunfire.





By July 1945 Jack received word regarding the granting of his discharge, as Teaching was a protected profession, he could return home to teaching in Victoria. On arrival home, Jack declined the request to serve as a Radar Officer for the R.A.N, electing to continue in education. In 1946, while at Melbourne Teaching College, Jack met Jean, his "Faithful and loving wife", Jean. Jack & Jean were married on 9th April 1949 and later both spent many years as teachers and Principals of various schools around Victoria. After living in Black Rock, they moved to Mildura in 1952. Jack's main sporting activity was Tennis after his football career ceased due suffering a ruptured kidney. He served a period as President of Mildura Lawn Tennis Club.

Retiring to Frankston and joining the RSL on 24th January 1973, Jack and Jean continued their love of Bowls and Golf until recent years. Jack became the appointed Returns Officer for the club and was a well loved member who was honoured with Life Membership of the Frankston RSL.

Jack & Jean recently celebrated their 70th Wedding Anniversary surrounded by their family

The Devotion of Our Nurses

Twice a year the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) publish commemorative posters for both ANZAC and Remembrance times.

Over the period of the ANZAC Centenary these all focused on events during World War 1 and shared the experiences of ours who served. This year, a variation of a theme with the work of Nurses, that many have been forgotten by some, being showcased.

Ever since the first military nurses sailed for the Boer War in South Africa in January 1900, Australian nurses have served around the world. They have worked under the most hazardous conditions, endured extreme discomfort in the most harrowing of circumstances and sometimes lost their lives. In this edition we honour both their memory and their sacrifice from then to now in both war and peace.

In the Hall of Memory at the Australian War Memorial there are 15 stained glass windows. Each shows a figure dressed in military uniform and under each figure is a word which describes the quality displayed by Australians in wartime. One window features a Nurse. She represents all Military nurses who have shown dedication to their patients and a commitment to caring for the sick and wounded during wartime.





The window's theme is Devotion and the thread, "A nurse, with the Red Cross as the symbol of charity. In the panel above her are a shield bearing the badges of the six states in the Australian coat of arms, and a pelican feeding her young from her bleeding breast, the ancient symbol of devotion".

The nurses had expected to care for men wounded in battle, but much of their time was taken up caring for the sick, particularly typhoid patients. The work was hard, and the days long and tiring. Many patients died. At one hospital, a nurse wrote that "thirty-one graves marked our short stay of three months".

The Australian Army Nursing Service (AANS) was formed in July 1903 as part of the Australian Army Medical Corps. More than 2,000 of its members served overseas during the First World War.

Nurses worked in hospitals, on hospital ships and trains, or in casualty clearing stations closer to the front line. They served in locations from Britain to India, including France and Belgium, the Mediterranean, and the Middle East.

Right from the Gallipoli landings on 25 April 1915, nurses cared for hundreds of casualties in the hospital and transport ships anchored off-shore. Despite the constant threat of Turkish shelling or torpedoes, the exhausted nurses cleaned, bandaged, warmed, and comforted their patients, many of whom had terrible wounds or were suffering from the effects of gangrene and disease. After the First World War, some service nurses married and left the workforce; others took over the care of family.

More than 4,000 Australian nurses served in a variety of locations, seventy-eight nurses died, some through accident or illness, but most as a result of enemy action or while prisoners of war.

By 1945, all military nurses had been appointed as officers, although many still preferred to use their traditional titles of "sister" and "matron". They were yet to be given the same status and pay as male officers.

Korean conflict was our first time not serving under the Australian Flag. In Vietnam the nurses' quarters at the 1st Australian Field Hospital and were nicknamed "Fort Petticoat". They were long wooden buildings with metal roofs, cement floors and louvre windows. To keep cool, each nurse was given a small electric fan for her room.

In more recent times ours served in Timor and the Middle East and around the world on

humanitarian missions in places such a Cambodia and Somalia

So next time you hear the word "Devotion" remember our Nurses.



Veterans' Welfare



Pensions and Welfare are not new to Frankston as we have been doing this important and vital role since our inception. Like all things and time saw a need for change and in 2013 we opened our Frankston Veterans' Centre. In 2018 due to a number of factors including the introduction of the new "Accredited Training" we merged with the Southern Peninsula Veterans' Centre that had served the Peninsula for almost 25 years to form the Peninsula Veterans' Hub. The project will be run by ANZAC House and in conjunction with the Warrnambool Hub are the two pilot Hubs with more to be rolled out across the State to better serve our veterans. Our staff are both RSL employees and Volunteers with one common goal, "Excellence in veterans' Support". Of note is that in the past six months the workload at Frankston has seen a sharp increase in demand for our services with our client base even spreading to outside Victoria and a few from overseas. The Frankston RSL Welfare Team and Hospital Visitations Group also work alongside the Advocates.

Angela Northeast

Ange joined the SPVC over 3 years ago and is our Administration Manager looking after both Reception and Administration at PVH. She is a qualified ADTP Wellbeing Advocate and this greatly assists all who we serve as a large proportion of our clients require assistance with both Compensation and Wellbeing issues. Ange takes the appointments, assists the Advocates and has a close and strong working relationship with both the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) systems and staff. She is also our statistician.



Butch is a local for over 45 years and now lives in Frankston. He was conscripted and served in Vietnam during 1970/71 with the 1st Field Squadron as a Field Engineer and a proud "Tunnel Rat". Butch has volunteered at the Southern Peninsula Veterans' centre for over 20 years before the SPVC amalgamated with Frankston to form the now Peninsula Veterans' Hub. His years of service to the veteran community have been admired and valued by all he has assisted over his Volunteering career. Butch is a qualified Pension Officer.

Like 'Butch', Anthony is a Vietnam Vet and served with 7 RAR in 1966-68. Anthony has been volunteering for over 19 years and also spends time at the Geelong Veterans' Centre. He is a Military Compensation Level 3 and is able to work across all three Acts that our veterans are covered by under Federal Law and qualified to seek redress for Veterans at both the Review Board and the AAT. Anthony is one of our hard-working Volunteers and lives in Mornington and is now a Frankston RSL Service Member.



Phil enlisted into the Australian Army in 1980 as an Infantry soldier and went on to serve 20 years when he retired from the Corp of Transport at the rank of Major. Phil went on to serve the Stawell RSL Sub Branch as Projects Officer, Welfare Officer and Vice President. When he returned to Melbourne he joined the Southern Peninsula Veterans' Centre (SPVC) as a Pensions Officer and Level 4 Advocate, and later joined the TIP team in Victoria as a Presenter and State Training Manager. In recent years Phil took on the role as Chairman of the SPVC and oversaw a successful amalgamation with the Frankston Young Veterans' Centre to form the Peninsula Veterans' Hub. In February we held our AGM with very little change to the executive committee but we have so new faces on the general committee.


At our meeting in April we presented Dave Stevenson a Certificate of Appreciation for his work towards our Subbranch (see picture).


