It is an honour and privilege to present my 8th annual report as your President.

2022 saw us return to some form of normality, after two years of COVID restrictions and our building redevelopment works. It is wonderful to see our regulars returning to the club, along with many new faces.

MEMBERSHIP

The year started with a total membership base of 10,019, coming down from our pre-covid 13,216 members. I am pleased to advise that we are back on track in 2023 with an increased membership level, ending the year with 13,423 members. A proportion of this increase can be attributed to the closure of the Cranbourne RSL and we welcome these members to our fold. While Cranbourne was a joint club with Dandenong, it is easier to travel from Cranbourne to Frankston, than Cranbourne to Dandenong.

VETERANS WELLBEING

We spent a significant proportion of the year focusing on our Wellbeing department and devising strategies to stimulate resilience in our veterans, as opposed to reliance. In the past, unfortunately some advocates and Sub-Branches have found it easier to throw money at veterans without understanding the cause of their need for assistance.

In conjunction with financial assistance, we have also focussed on other aspects of veteran welfare, such as combatting social isolation. Several sponsored bus trips were enjoyed by many veterans and their families, with record numbers attending various excursions to destinations such as Queenscliff, Philip Island, and the Yarra Valley. Weekly morning teas are also provided by the Sub-Branch; one for veterans, widows, and families, and the other for all veterans of all genders, ages, and service types. Contact our Wellbeing Coordinator, Stellar, for more information on morning tea sessions. These events are greatly appreciated by both groups and attendance levels have been steadily growing, averaging 20-25 participants per session.

REMEMBRANCE DAY 2022


Remembrance Day was also particularly memorable as we officially renamed the Veterans and Families Wellbeing Hub in honour of Dr. John Finch Akeroyd. The hub will now be officially called the "Dr. Akeroyd Veterans and Families Wellbeing Hub". We were fortunate to have members of Dr. Akeroyd's family in attendance on the day to witness the official unveiling ceremony and his legacy being honoured. In addition to helping veterans, we spent \$42,500 installing two soundproof booths in the veterans' area to enable advocates to have interviews in private.

There was so much gratification to be able to finally hold our normal ANZAC Day services following COVID, with Captain Oborne CSM RAN, as our guest speaker at both services. Following the Anzac Day Service, 450 members enjoyed a sit-down lunch back at the club. Remembrance Day was equally gratifying, with a record number of 150 people attending, even though it was held indoors in our Function room due to the prognosis of bad weather.

We were fortunate to have had two very successful appeals in 2022, where over \$100,000 was raised during ANZAC Day commemorations, and a further \$63K+ for Remembrance Day. These are record figures in the history of the club and we thank Peter Kerley, Appeals Coordinator and Committee Member, for the extraordinary effort he put into running two very successful Appeals.

NEW MANAGEMENT

The year could have been in absolute turmoil with the resignation of our Operations Manager, Annemaree Kelly after 28 years, and the retirement of our General Manager Rob Morrison who was at the helm of the Frankston RSL for 16 years. This change in management, along with similar movement in the kitchen with chefs coming and going, could have put the club in a vulnerable position.

While we wished both well, as they moved on, we welcomed Colin Ross, Operations Manager, and Brett Rowlands as General Manager. Both have been working in successful clubs in Melbourne and have ingrained themselves well, within our business and membership. The changing over of staff also occurred within other areas of business including, bars, gaming room, front-of-house, and the kitchen. Like most hospitality organisations around the country, we have been struggling with staffing since COVID.






GAMING MACHINES

Another significant change we also had to contend with in 2022 was the outright purchasing of our gaming machines from TABCORP and having them serviced by a team at ANZAC House. This means that profits received from gaming machines goes into the coffers to assist veterans and the running of the business instead of a private owner's pocket, or another privately/publicly owned business. Due to the success of the business, we were able to pay off the remaining \$1.25 million of our variable loan, borrowed for the renovations.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

BRIAN HILL CSC

TREASURER'S REPORT

It is my pleasure to present the Treasurer's Report for 2022 - a year of consolidation following the COVID 19 Pandemic and trading restrictions the venue endured during 2020 and 2021.

I am pleased to report the Frankston Sub-Branch Incorporated (Inc) had the most successful year in it's history, with a total income of \$19,019,4242 and a record profit of \$811,632. It would not be reasonable to compare 2022 trading results with those of 2021, however, as an indication of the growth experienced in 2022, the figures for 2019 were \$16,725,049 revenue and \$121,853 profit. Except for the increased profit, there was a general growth across all areas of the venue, in 2022, of circa 8% and 9%, versus performance of 2019.

A key expenditure in 2022 was \$4,862,024 in wages, which was 9.1% increase against 2019 expenditure. The increase was due in part to the national wage rise but also to the retirement and or resignation of several senior management staff and chefs that necessitated the payouts of accumulated entitlements and long service leave.

A significant expenditure in 2022 was the outright purchase of our EGCs (Electronic Gaming Consoles) at a cost of \$1,277,425. The purchase was a planned acquisition since 2017, where the Sub-Branch had been accumulating a cash reserve to meet this purchase. Purchasing the EGCs will provide the Sub-Branch greater flexibility and control over gaming operating costs, in addition to providing long term savings with the removal of leasing costs.

At the start of 2022, the Sub-Branch had an overarching loan debt of \$5.882m in order to complete the major renovations work undertaken in 2020. This debt was split between a fixed loan of \$4.667m, and variable loan of \$1.215m. During the year, \$0.458m was paid against the fixed loan, and the variable loan was paid out in full. The Committee made the decision to pay out the variable loan in order to reduce interest payments, given the rising interest rate experienced throughout the year. The fixed loan is in place until 2024, at which time a new loan will be negotiated on the residual balance.

A key objective of the RSL is to provide support to veterans and their families. Throughout 2022, \$273 523.00 in total was spent supporting veterans requiring assistance and providing activities to veterans and their families to overcome social isolation. Additionally, the Sub-Branch purchased a second vehicle, at a cost of \$36,300, to be used by our dedicated Wellbeing Officer for home and hospital visits and to transport veterans to appointments. The Sub-Branch also returned \$34,490 of unused funds to the State Branch that were from the General Appeals Account - which will now be used by the State Branch to assist smaller RSLs provide State wide support to veterans.

In summary, the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch had a strong and profitable 2022 and was in a sound financial position at the end of the year, placing the Sub-Branch in an optimal position going forward in 2023.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Committee members, our Finance Manager Lynda, and Assistant Finance Manager Marion, for their assistance and on-going support for 2022.

My sincere thanks go to Colin Ross, Operations Manager, for his tireless dedication to his role. Taking over from Anne Maree (AMK) was always going to be a difficult task. But Colin delivers every day with his experience, compassion and work ethic. The Club is destined for great things with this leadership team.

STAFF

Each day, when you visit your Club, it is my aim for a smiling face to deliver an excellent experience. Whether you are coming for a show, a coffee, watching a sports event or having a meal, I hope that you leave with a smile, having enjoyed your leisure time with us.

This experience comes from our amazing staff. Our crew comes in every day to help deliver to you a great time at the RSL. There are so many behind the scenes people who you as the member don't see, including chefs, kitchen staff and office staff. This is on top of those who you do see, working at reception, gaming, Huey's Sports Bar and the Bistro.

Our staff numbers hovered around 100 for most of the year, and one of the ways we acknowledge their hard work is through our 'Above and Beyond' program. Each month, we recognise one person from each department as a winner for having gone above and beyond and receive a \$50 gift card. Quarterly, we award one of the twelve monthly winners a \$150 gift voucher. My congratulations go to Sam Bryant on winning this award in quarter four.




COMMUNITY SUPPORT FUND

GAMING 2022 PROJECT

During the year, the purchase of gaming machines from Tabcorp and cessation of the leasing arrangement that had been in place since 2012 reached fruition. Taking control of this part of the business had been planned for well over 5 years, and a seamless transition took place on 16 August. This change required a significant capital outlay, which had been accumulated in previous years. This new arrangement gives the Club greater control over expenses within this segment. The financial results do show the large movement from cash holdings to assets from this.





STAFFING CHALLENGES

It has been widely reported of the staffing challenges facing hospitality and other sectors in a post COVID world. We have felt this as much as anyone. Thankfully, it does appear to be receding as we enter 2023. We appreciate your patience and understanding as at times, we have not been able to deliver the standard we expect due to this.

FINANCIAL RESULTS

The results of 2022 are very pleasing following the challenges and financial losses of 2020 and 2021. Seeing growth in all departments vs 2019 is a very proud achievement. The full financial report outlines the growth and profitability we have delivered for the membership. The delivery of services to veterans and community is there for all to see. Every day, we deliver a large hospitality operation with the goal of raising funds to assist veterans and the community in any way we can. Last year we spent over \$270 000 on the delivery of services to veterans across the entity - something we can all be proud of.

2023 AND BEYOND

2023 promises to be an exciting year for the RSL. We have fantastic shows booked in throughout the year, including Jeff Duff in May, Denise Drysdale for Christmas in July, Wendy Matthews & Grace Knight in Birthday week, and Frankie J & Wilbur in October. CP's will be reopening in March, our weekly raffles are getting bigger and better all the time, and the Club continues to expand its offer to members and the community.

Finally, my thanks go to the committee for the support and guidance they have provided to me in the first six months of my tenure. In particular, the tireless work of our President Kevin Hillier OAM, who has guided me through the initial stages of leading such a magnificent Club. It has been an initiation of mammoth proportions, and I look forward to the years ahead.



Veterans & Families Wellbeing Hub Conception to Implementation

Kevin provided support to Anzac House with the transition of the Frankston Veteran Hub into the new Regional Anzac House Veteran Well-being Hub, including the appointment of a Wellbeing Officer, and a Regional Case Navigator. Kevin was a key player in ensuring the centre is more inclusive to all veterans and their families, than historically, welcoming all groups within the veteran community; sub-groups who regularly make use of the club for meetings, coffee mornings, and group lunches, as well as our RSL sporting groups who also utilise the facility for committee meetings, and liaising with local council.

As Veterans Central became established at ANZAC House, Kevin became more involved with the new processes involved in the provision of wellbeing and advocacy to our veterans.

As a result, the RSL Advocate, Pension Officers, and several

Welfare and Wellbeing Officers all work at the Veterans Centre which is now regarded as a 'Hub' permanently housing paid compensation advocates, a manager, and our own Frankston RSL Wellbeing Coordinator.

As a "Hub" this has grown over the last few years. Kevin has close communication with the team at ANZAC House, including the social worker at VETCEN into each of the Wellbeing meetings via ZOOM to receive expert advice in areas that our Wellbeing Advocates are not experienced in, for the benefit of our veterans.

Kevin spearheaded the naming of the Hub to 'Veterans and Families Wellbeing Hub', after the former President of the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch - Dr. John Finch Akeroyd, AM, MBE, ED, MB, BS, FRACP, FACRM. Additionally, he executed the idea of the 'Table for the missing" as part of the Anzac Day 2022 Commemorative Service It was a focal point of the luncheon after the Commemorative Service.

He has served the Victorian State Branch of the RSL as the Senior Marshall (Bands) for the ANZAC DAY March in Melbourne 1996-2002. This position includes liaising, coordinating, planning, and positioning of many bands of various sizes that take part in the march each year.

Kevin is currently the president of Frankston RSL Sub-Branch and has been the Committee member since 2008. He has served as Secretary from 2008 to 2015 and has been President from 2015 to the present day, 2022.

Additional Service Committees

On Remembrance Day, The Frankston RSL Sub branch, in conjunction with Veteran Central and ANZAC House, nominated to name the Veterans and Families Wellbeing Hub, located at the Frankston RSL, after the former President of the Frankston RSL Sub Branch - Dr. John Finch Akeroyd, AM., MBE., ED., MB., BS., FRACP., FACRM., 1909-1982.

Dr Akeroyd was a former President of the Frankston RSL for 18 years, who dedicated much of his life to supporting veterans and the Returned Services League of Australia as well as the community.



Dr. John Finch Akeroyd AM., MBE., ED., MB., BS., FRACP., FACRM., 1909-1982, dedicated much of his life to support veterans and the Returned Services League of Australia. He held a myriad of positions at the Frankston Sub-branch and Victorian Branch throughout the years including President Frankston RSL 1950-1968, Vice President Victorian Branch 1964-1968, 1975-1979 and Senior Vice President 1975-1979. He was also the recipient of the Gold Badge — the RSL's highest award for rendering outstanding service to the League, ex-service personnel, or their dependants.

He was known to some as the man with 21 letters after his name and his association with community groups and organisations was seemingly endless.

As a young doctor he had a practice in Frankston before going to war. He was a member of 46th Battalion (Brighton) and when the unit was formed, he became Regiment Medical Officer and was transferred to 22nd Battalion, with which he served until being captured in Rabaul at the fall of New Guinea. He could have escaped but he chose to stay with the wounded and set up a hospital in the jungle until he was captured by the Japanese. In 1942 he was shipped to Japan and remained a prisoner of war for 4.5 years.









Selfless & Honourable

He returned home with tuberculosis and tropical ulcers, weighing only 7 stone from his former 18 stone. He worked at the Heidelberg Repatriation Hospital for two years, then returned to his practice in Frankston. He was a foundation member of Menzies Home for Children and was on the Committee of Management for 31 years.

He was also a member of Legacy and was on Frankston High School Advisory Council and a life governor of Frankston Hospital. He was a member of the War Veterans' Homes Trust and was awarded the MBE for his devotion to the war troops, since he could have returned to Australia being a medical officer, but would not leave his men. He was also a member of the board of management at Mt Eliza Geriatric Centre and for many years he was Frankston municipality's medical officer of health.

Dr. Akeroyd's legacy speaks volumes and the decision to rename the Veterans and Families Hub in his honour was unanimous.



On Remembrance Day, the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch was fortunate to receive a special donation from the family of a WW1 Veteran. The Hanton family donated a WW1 medallion for service that was awarded to William Mark Hanton by the citizens of Frankston on his return from the war. The medallion was stolen during the 1950's, only to have been spotted on eBay in 2019 by a family member - who is a memorabilia collector and purchased it back for the family. The precious and generous donation will be displayed with the Memorabilia collection at the Frankston RSL.



We are fortunate to now have the lettering of "Lest We Forget" mounted on the façade of the club.

The lettering was originally part of a memorial wall at the Frankston Council Chambers. Subsequently, when the new war memorial was built in 2016 at Beauty Park, Frankston, there was nowhere to place the letters and were therefore, put away in storage.

We are thrilled to have them on display at the venue, where they will remain for a very long time. Thank you to Graham from our Memorabilia Team and the Committee for making this happen.

BATTLE OF BERSHEEBA

On the 31st of October we remember, and honour, all involved in the battle of Beersheba - The Charge of the 4th Light Horse, 1917, in memory of the Australians who fought bravely to preserve our freedoms.

These eight mates have 153 years of service between them and are some of the former members of the Royal Australian Armoured Corps, 4th/19th Prince of Wales' Light Horse Regiment (RAAC) serving from 1960's-90's who meet and 'lunch' monthly at the Frankston RSL following a tradition started by the 'old boys' of the original 4th Light Horse Regiment 1917, that met once a month at the Regiment's Sergeants Mess until there were no more.

2022 marked the 105th Anniversary of the battle. Beersheba was a heavily fortified town 43 kilometres from the Turkish bastion of Gaza, and it was the scene of an historic charge by the 4th Light Horse Brigade.



CEREMONIAL TABLE FOR THE MISSING

Traditions and customs are so highly esteemed because of the emotion connected to them. They are often what connects a community, friends, or family, together, and are an essential component of any culture. One such custom that we hold highly at the Frankston RSL is the 'Ceremonial Table' for the Missing.

The white table cloth is symbolic of the purity of their intentions to respond to our country's call to arms. A single red rose in the vase signifies the blood that many have shed in sacrifice to ensure the freedom of our beloved Australia. This rose also reminds us of the family and friends of our missing comrades who keep the faith, while waiting their return. The inverted glass represents the fact that the missing and fallen cannot partake. The salt is symbolic of the countless tears shed by the families. The slice of lemon on the bread plate represents the bitter fate of those lost or missing. The lit candle is reminiscent of the light of hope which lives in our hearts to illuminate their way home, away from their captors, to the open arms of a grateful nation. Three settings for our Sailors, Soldiers, & Airmen. The fourth setting, an empty chair, represents the missing, and fallen, and those that worked in the background such as nurses, doctors, and administration.





SUPORT & ASSISTANCE FOR VETERANS & DEPARTMENTS

We had 393 wellbeing requests for assistance and support to veterans and their dependents. Requests have ranged from assisting with free and confidential Wellbeing Advocacy, providing financial assistance to those in need, conducted home visits, and helped navigating My Aged Care and Veterans Home Care, for example. We have provided information to local social and community service organisations, and referrals to services as required. We also have free RSL Funeral Representatives that have attended the funeral of veterans and carried out the RSL Funeral Ritual, which is our last important way of honouring veterans. WELLBEING SOCIAL CONNECTION ACTIVITIES

Our aim is to provide veterans of all eras, service types, genders, including National Service, Reservists, and those with or without overseas service, with friendly and sociable activities. Our small Welfare Bus was also busy all year taking participants to a variety of places, such as the Dandenongs, Lara, Cranbourne, Seymour, and a tour of the Christmas Lights.

VETERANS HEALTH WEEK OCTOBER 2022

Veterans Health Week was in October, with a theme of 'Eat Well' and we held a free lunch for nearly 60 veterans and family members, with a talk from a Peninsula Health dietitian, and takehome information and healthy treat packs for all participants.

Our total volunteer hours for 2022 was 7,058. We couldn't do what we do without the extraordinary assistance of all our volunteers. In May we celebrated National Volunteer Week Theme 'Better Together' with a free lunch, live music, and presentations.

LAWNS

We continue to mow 450 lawns for aged veterans and their partners, and/or veterans who are physically unable to mow their own.

HELLO PROGRAM PHONE-CALLS TO SERVICE MEMBERS

In 2022 three Wellbeing Support Officers and the Coordinator were busy making phone-calls to our Service Members over the age of 80. The Hello Program is a good opportunity to check in on our veterans' and connect them with our Wellbeing Team if they need information, connections to services, a home visit, or other support and assistance.

AGE STRONG EXERCISE CLASSES

Our Age Strong Exercise classes aim to keep veterans and their families, as well as community members, fit and socially active. Run by PARC and held at the Frankston RSL Pavilion, the classes are held twice a week, on Tuesdays and Fridays, 8am-9am, at a subsidised and affordable cost of \$6 p/p.

COMBINED GROUPS NETWORK

Members of the Auxiliary, Mornington Peninsula Legacy, Partners of Veterans Association, Frankston Vietnam Veterans, and Veterans and Families Hub have regular meetings throughout the year to share updates and information and plan social activities. In 2022 we had bus-trips to Phillip Island Vietnam Veterans Museum, Yarra Valley Railway, and Melbourne Zoo, again heavily subsidised by the sub-branch.

HOME & HOSPITAL VISITATION TEAM

In 2022, our Home & Hospital Visitation Team spent 153.50 hours visiting veterans and their partners in 12 local residential aged care facilities. At Christmas, the Team prepared 350 Christmas Parcels for veterans and their partners, which were greatly appreciated by the veterans, widow/ers and families.

VETERANS AND ASSOCIATED GROUPS CHRISTMAS PARTY

On the 6th December, 99 people attended the Christmas Party in the Simpson Room at the club. Veterans, and members of the Auxiliary, Mornington-Peninsula Legacy, Partners of Veterans Association, Vietnam Veterans, FRSL Home & Hospital Visitation Team enjoyed a three course Christmas meal.

FURNITURE. WHITE GOODS AND MOBILITY AIDS

Tony, one of our Wellbeing Advocates, and a dedicated group of volunteers continued to assist veterans by collecting donations of an estimated \$27,957 worth of furniture, white-goods, and mobility aids. These have been redistributing to appreciative veterans in need. Thank you to all who so kindly donated items.

MAKING CHANGES THAT COUNT

With the increase in cost-of-living expenses and with rental payments taking a large part of his pension, a veteran needed an alternative lifestyle to assist in maintaining his financial stability.

In partnership with the Frankston RSL Wellbeing Advocates, the veteran was relocated from his three bedroom rental property into an independent living studio unit at Vasey RSL Care Frankston South. This change lowered his rental payments and had the added benefit of providing a sense of community as he is able to socialise with other veterans in the shared community space.

To accommodate his dog Ricky, the veteran's best friend and constant companion, the sub-branch was able to assist with the building of a fence in the backyard of his unit.

Moving to a smaller property meant that extra storage was required for items that didn't fit within the unit. Frankston RSL was able to provide a shed, purchased from Bunnings, and with the help of his new neighbours, the veteran was able to erect it in his backyard and store his excess tools and furniture.

FRSL Compensation Advocates have also assisted the veteran with pension and health submissions to DVA.
While his case is being assessed, the veteran's wellbeing continues to improve as does his positive outlook for the future.





Jim Saxe was a member of the Victorian Police Force in 1955 when he was called up for compulsory National Service.
Choosing to join the RAAF, Jim completed his 176 days of compulsory service and remained on reserve for 5 years.

IMPROVING

VETERAN'S LIFESTYLE

Jim enjoyed service life so much that when he retired from the police force he joined the Army, and trained with the Special Forces (Green Beret). On graduating he gained a commission as a Lieutenant and served with the Special Forces in Vietnam in 1971. On discharge, Jim joined the Fire Brigade until eventually joining private business enterprises until his retirement. Jim was a member of Frankston RSL from 1962 when it was located in Davey Street, until the early 1990's when he moved interstate for his work. He was a committee member of the Frankston RSL and a President (Chairman) of the Frankston RSL Golf Club. In this role he introduced the Golf Section Constitution and Rules, doubled the Section membership, and redesigned the 18 hole putting green and undercover BBQ area. Now, in his mid-80s, Jim suffers from severe hearing loss. Recently the Frankston RSL was able to assist him with the purchase of an iPad with speech to text capability.



Sadly, one of our newest 2022 service members passed away in December. It was an honour to have Keith Hearne in our midst. In September, Keith was made Honorary Life Member of the Brisbane 31st Infantry Battalion Association for his active service during WWII and for his post war devotion to the 2/31st Battalion's achievements and those who served.

Keith held a myriad of honours and awards and served on copious committees.

Things we take for granted have now become easier for Jim; watching TV was impossible without captioning but now he can place the iPad near the TV and he is able to read the captions on his iPad regardless of whether the program has captioning or not.

Jim's contribution throughout the years to both defence and community is highly commendable. As a result of his service, we continue to openly support Jim in every endeavour to improve his lifestyle.



REGAINING INDEPENDENCE

John Boyer joined the RAN in 1945 and trained as a Marine Engineer (Stoker), obtaining a rank of Leading Hand. His first trip overseas was to serve with the Occupational Forces in Japan after World War 2.

Between 1950 and 1954 John served for periods on HMAS Bataan and HMAS Arunta - completing tours of duty in Korea during the Korean War. For this service, he received his 'Australian War Service Medals', the 'United Nations Peace Medal', and more recently John was the recipient of both the 'Ambassador For Peace Medal' and the 'Deed of Appreciation Medal' from the Korean Government.

During his 15 years service John returned overseas on many occasions and on one trip aboard the HMAS Bataan he was involved in fighting with a fleet of pirate ships in the South China Sea.



Happy Birthday Duncan and thank you for all that you have done for the Australian Service.






HAPPY 400TH BIRTHDAY TO BOB ARNOLD World War II Veteran!




Making a difference!




We recently caught up with our Community Support Partner WALLARA, at the stunning Sages Cottage Farm and chatted to CEO Phil Hayes-Brown
