PRESIDENT'S REPORT



KEVIN HILLIER OAM

On behalf of the Committee, it is with a strong sense of pride and achievement that I submit for your approval and adoption, my report for the 2024 year.

In this period, we saw a further consolidation of the work initiated and carried out throughout COVID-19 (2020-2021). Employee count has now reverted to normal and pre 2020 staffing levels. I am also pleased to report that Management is working well as a team, the Committee continues to serve, and our Wellbeing Department and Advocates continue to excel.

VETERAN WELLBEING

The wellbeing report will highlight and demonstrate the many areas where we continue to provide assistance to veterans and their families, some of which include financial advice, advocacy, supply of household and white goods, and two socialisation opportunities with coffee mornings at the club each Wednesday for veterans and their partners, and Fridays for veterans of all eras.

The coffee mornings have grown throughout the year, and we now have the regular attendance of up to 40 participants, in addition to the 'Women's Friendship Group' that are now providing morning tea for the Independent Living Units at Vasey RSL Care Frankston South (RSL Park).





The financial report will highlight the funds allocated to veterans and the community in 2024. These amounts are figures we should all be very proud of and for the benefit of our members, although a veteran does not need to be a member of the RSL to receive assistance.



VETERAN ADVOCACY

Veteran Wellbeing has grown from assisting 126 veterans in 2021, 206 veterans in 2022, 265 veterans in 2023, and 301 in 2024. The Veteran Wellbeing Team, comprising of Wellbeing Coordinator - Stellar, and Wellbeing Advocates and Support Officers, Tony, Carol, and Anthony, has excelled in its assistance to veterans and their families.

NEW WELLBEING SPACE IN 2025

In my 2023 report, I advised that ANZAC House had received a grant from the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) to place a portable office within the car park of the club, adjoining the Pavilion. Whilst there have been building and installation challenges along the way associated with the acquisition, I am hopeful that by the time this report is printed in early 2025, our 10 Veteran Wellbeing Support Officers and ANZAC House Pensions and Compensation Advocates, who continue to do the amazing work they do with veterans and their families, will have relocated to the 72m² new Veterans and Families Wellbeing Space.

VETERAN AND COMMUNITY SUPPORT 2024

We continued to support ANZAC House in their endeavours to assist veterans around the State of Victoria, both physically and financially and to the tune of approximately \$170,000 during this period. These funds, from 10A Sub-Branches like the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch, assist with the running of ANZAC House and support smaller sub-branches around the state in conjunction with the support veterans receive through Veteran Central.

Our support to veterans has grown considerably in 2024, and over \$500,000 was spent on wellbeing, welfare, and veteran support programs. Additionally, each week Residential Care Homes in the area are provided with lunch at the venue, making for a wonderful opportunity for residents to stay socially connected; in 2024, 1301 residents attended these lunches and just over \$26,447 was spent on the lunches.

While our support to veterans and their families has grown, so too has our community support to charities and sporting clubs within our region. Over \$250,000 was contributed to our Community Support Program, and as this is a two-way street, we thank community clubs for their support to the venue.



MEMBERSHIP LEVELS

Changes to Service and Affiliate Membership Levels in 2024 was due to Frankston RSL Sub-Branch financially assisting Mornington RSL with the payment of their overheads. The Mornington RSL Sub-Branch was not active as a business throughout this period and membership had dwindled. At the end of 2024, the Mornington Sub-Branch returned their charter, and all members were offered membership with Frankston RSL Sub-Branch. This also means that the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch Appeals will now be conducted in the suburbs of Langwarrin, Frankston, Mt Eliza, Mornington, Mount Martha, and Moorooduc. Whilst this gives us a further opportunity to raise important funds for veterans, which Peter Kerley, Appeals Coordinator and Committee Secretary successfully does, it also means our sub-branch will need more volunteers going forward to successfully run both the ANZAC Day and Poppy Appeals.

WORLD WAR II MEDALLIONS

I was also privileged to attend Vasey RSL Care Frankston South (RSL Park), and present eight World War II Medallions to surviving veterans in care.











MINISTER FOR VETERANS' AFFAIRS VISIT

During the year we were honoured to host the Minister for Veterans' Affairs and Minister for Defence Personnel, The Hon Matt Keogh MP, and Federal Member for Dunkley, Jodie Belyea, for a chat and walk around the club, who were most impressed with our facility and the work carried out by our Wellbeing Department.











CLUB DEVELOPMENT

Strategic Planning and future club development are under constant consideration as we continue to reduce our debt following the last renovation.

COMMEMORATIVE SERVICES

2024 saw our most successful ANZAC and Remembrance Day services, notwithstanding the ANZAC Day commemoration held in 2015 at Frankston Football Oval.

ANZAC DAY 2024

The numbers continue to grow and we held another successful ANZAC Day Commemoration at Frankston War Memorial, Beauty Park, with attendance of circa 6,000 for the Dawn service and 2,000 for the 11AM service. Afterwards, and on the completion of the service, we hosted 750 veterans and families for lunch at the club, which our wonderful staff were able to serve in 40 minutes and the 'Ceremonial Table for the Missing' once again being a highlight of the day.







REMEMBRANCE DAY 2024

Remembrance Day was equally gratifying and we were proud to conduct the largest Remembrance Day service for many years with over 300 in attendance, including 20 local organisations and students from eight local schools.





APPEALS

We were fortunate to have had two successful appeals in 2024, raising over \$134,000 for the ANZAC Day Appeal, and a further \$124,000 for the Poppy Appeal.

These are record figures in the history of the club and we thank Peter Kerley, Appeals Coordinator, for the extraordinary effort he put into running both appeals and coordinating volunteers. His passion has seen the income raised from the appeals grow remarkably during the period. A special thank you also to the volunteers that make all of this happen and to everybody who purchased appeals merchandise.





VALE

We were saddened to receive the notification by families of the passing of 42 service members, and I offer them my sincere condolences. Unfortunately, we are often not advised of the passing of a service member and sometimes we are told well after the event. This is a timely reminder that deceased service members are entitled to a RSL Ritual as part of the funeral service.

TREASURER'S REPORT

"I am pleased to report that once again, the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch Incorporated (Inc) recorded its best trading year to date. Income generated for the year was \$20,909,000, which was \$277,289 (1.34%) greater than 2023."

FINANCIAL SUMMARY 2024

It is my pleasure to submit, for your approval and adoption, the Treasurer's Report for 2024. I am pleased to report that once again, the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch Incorporated (Inc) recorded its best trading year to date. Income generated for the year was \$20,909,000, which was \$277,289 (1.34%) greater than 2023.

Unfortunately, increasing and ongoing cost pressures resulted in expenses for the year being \$21,353,267, which was \$717,573 (3.48%) greater than 2023 expenses. This resulted in the sub-branch trading account recording a loss of \$444,267. While this is disappointing, there were factors that contributed to this outcome. These include, but are not limited to:

- ·Staff wages \$5,517,221
- ·Rent \$1,224,389
- •Gaming Machine Licence liability \$562,885 Veteran and Community Support - \$809,867

The end of year outcome in the Patriotic Fund (PF) was more favourable with the fund recording a profit of \$538,475. The PF derives most of its income from rent paid by the sub-branch, which was \$1,224,389 in 2024. The rent is used to maintain or improve the premises and service the bank loan taken out for the redevelopment undertaken in 2020. Loan repayments made for 2024 were \$1,227,885 and the outstanding loan balance at the end of the year was \$2,482,515.

Frankston RSL Sub-Branch acts as an Agent of the RSL State Branch General Appeals Account. Appeals monies are primarily raised through the Annual ANZAC and Remembrance Day Poppy Appeals. A total of \$261,400 was raised through the appeals and donations in 2024. A portion (50%) of this was retained by the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch to support veterans in our area.

The balance was paid to the State Branch General Appeals Account to be utilised for statewide veteran support. For 2024, \$74,563 was expended on direct support for veterans or their families. The Frankston RSL Sub-Branch is returning a further \$43,983 to the Victorian RSL State Branch (Veteran Central) to further assist in statewide veteran support.

In summary, the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch had a strong trading year in 2024 and, despite the ongoing cost of living pressure, is in a sound financial position. I commend the management and staff of the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch for the strong position the sub-branch is currently in, and the solid platform the sub-branch has going forward in 2025.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Committee, and the Finance Team of Lynda, Jarrod, and Marion, for their assistance and on-going support throughout 2024.

FOOD & BEVERAGE OFFERING

Our food and beverage offer continues to grow and develop. The range and variety of craft beers alongside the continual improvements to the bistro and functions menu help us to deliver excellence in hospitality. Gaming delivered excellent results in a tough market. Our continued focus on customer service and new products is delivering great results for the venue.



FINANCIAL RESULTS

Financially, the results for 2024 across the 3 entities are pleasing. It is important to assess the entire operation of the venue across the Patriotic Fund and the Incorporated Association (INC). From those combined numbers, I would like to highlight the following key outcomes:

- ·Reduction in principal debt in Pat Fund of \$1.224 million
- ·Net profit between INC and Pat Fund of \$94 208
- ·Reallocation of assets between INC and Pat Fund
- •\$20.9 million in total sales (an increase of 1.3% on last year)
- ·Over \$639 000 spent on veterans across the 3 entities
- •Over \$342 000 spent on the community

The above numbers show the great outcomes this RSL delivers for veterans and the community through the provision of quality hospitality.

OPERATIONAL ADVANCEMENTS

In order to stay a step ahead in the highly competitive hospitality market we regularly update operational features at the venue. 2024 had a significant share of improvement updates, namely two new Member Rewards' Kiosks, 20 TV display screens, and numerous system and hardware advancements.


We host 350 functions, events, and tribute shows per annum, and our Functions Room received a well deserved facelift in the latter part of 2024. The refurb included a new design and very exciting AV and tech features installed, making the 350m² function space an enviable destination to hold any type of function or event on the Peninsula. The room has had an aesthetic as well as a functional upgrade with a 5m panoramic screen, copper benchtop cladding to the 8.5m² bar, copper wall lampshades and nine 1m brass chandeliers, a motorised wrap around stage curtain, and motorised sheer curtains and sun block to all windows.

Additionally, we added CP's restaurant to our function room offering, providing the venue with an additional 150m² in function space that is perfect for informal events and cocktail style functions.

Our great range of merchandise is regularly refreshed and sold at Reception, with a portion of sales going to veteran support programs.

A new permanent feature of our Bistro is our recent acquisition of a 'Gelato Van', that can also be hired for functions at the venue.

To finish off a great year, we were thrilled to feature on the limited edition Frankston Monopoly Board Game, that is a once in a lifetime opportunity.



2025 AND BEYOND

2025 is shaping up as another wonderful year for the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch. We have already delivered the Annual RSL Victoria Hall of Fame Awards Event, which was a formal black tie, three-course sit down dinner for the Victorian RSL network. We have a plethora of fantastic tribute acts coming to the venue, including The Eagles, Cocker Diamond, Creedence Clear Water Revival, Elvis and Abba. Other entertainment coming this year includes Faulty Towers, Denis Walter, Gold Logie winner John Wood, and another performance of West End to Broadway. ANZAC DAY 2024

2024 saw once again the public commemorating ANZAC Day, with approximately 6,000 in attendance at the Dawn Service, and 2,000 at the Commemorative and Wreath Laying Service.

We were fortunate to have Captain Adam Muckalt, RAN as guest speaker at both services on behalf of the Chief of Royal Australian Navy.

Mayor Cr Nathan Conroy, Frankston City Council, gave the opening address at the Dawn service, and Paul Edbrooke, local member for Frankston, gave the opening address at the Commemorative Service. Both services were supported by the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch Chaplain, Grahame Watkinson CSM, members of the Mornington Peninsula Welsh Ladies Choir, and local cadets from both Army and Air Force.

12 wreaths had been laid a day prior, by schools from the local area, and a further 30 wreaths were laid along the memorial wall during the Wreath Laying Service on ANZAC Day.

A highlight at the completion of both services is the laying of poppies in the garden and within the memorial, by all those who attend. This becomes a feature of the Frankston War Memorial for weeks after the event.

A special thanks to our local council workers for the way they present the War Memorial on these special occasions. Also, a special thanks to Lisa MacGregor from Scarlett Mac Events for her tireless work in preparing all the paperwork and onsite organisation of the event.

The lunch offered at the club, after the completion of the service, was again outstanding and enjoyed by 750 Frankston RSL Sub-Branch members and their families. We cannot thank our staff enough for the countless hours they put into organising the day, and who pay respect to our active service personnel and veterans and their families.

CCV AWARDS

2023-2024

We were honoured to have been awarded Best Mental and Social Wellbeing Program (Metro) at the esteemed Community Clubs Victoria (CCV) 2024 Gala Awards in July, and equally proud to have been shortlisted as one of the finalists for 'Best Hospitality Team'. This award is a significant achievement by our Veteran Wellbeing Team who rolled out an impressive Mental and Social Wellbeing Program for our veterans and their families in 2023.

In 2023, our Veteran Wellbeing Team offered a range of services including advocacy, financial assistance, and social activities, with 773 attendances by veterans and their families across 23 events.

The team, led by Wellbeing Coordinator Stellar, and Wellbeing Advocate Anthony Grice, rolled out an impressive Mental and Social Wellbeing Program for our veterans and their families providing over \$500,000 in support, distributed \$15,000 worth of essential items, and visited veterans in homes and hospitals to a total of 374 hours.

The efforts from our staff and committee cannot be underestimated, and we are truly humbled to have been recognised for the work we do in field of veteran mental health, welfare, and wellbeing, and a testament to our commitment and continuous development in this very worthy field.

The Last Post and Rouse were provided by Brooke Humphrey of the Frankston City Band, and piping for the laying of wreaths was provided by Geoff Shaw of the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch Pipes and Drums Section.

Jodie Belyea MP gave the opening address, followed by Frankston RSL Sub-Branch Chaplain Graeme Watkinson with prayers. Club President Kevin Hillier OAM gave the main address and touched on the service of George Mawby INGRAM VC MM who is interred at the Frankston Memorial Cemetery.

The service concluded with what has become a tradition, with the laying of poppies within the memorial and returning to the club for a light lunch.

Thank you to everybody involved from the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch in organising the service and making it a memorable event, and to the volunteers from our Home and Hospital Visitation Team, our Wellbeing Team, and the Army and Air Force.

A service was also held at the Mornington Cenotaph by the outgoing members of the now closed Mornington RSL Sub-Branch. Going forward, Frankston RSL Sub-Branch will provide support to veterans in the Mornington area.

Support & Assistance for Veterans and Dependants

Frankston RSL Sub-Branch's Wellbeing Team is always busy assisting veterans and their families with a range of support, from free and confidential Wellbeing Advocacy, financial assistance, help applying for medals, or support navigating My Aged Care and veterans Home Care. We can provide information and referrals to social and community organisations and we have RSL Funeral Representatives to carry out the Funeral Ritual for veterans.

In 2024 there were 474 individual wellbeing and pastoral care cases, where the team provided assistance and support to 301 veterans and their families.

Wellbeing Social Connection Activities

In 2024 there were 1,508 attendances by veterans and their families across 75 activities, including lunches, bus-trips and outings, afternoon teas and our massive Veterans and their Families Expo. Our littlest attendee was 18 months old, and our oldest was 101! In 2024 we took big buses to the Melbourne Museum, Point Nepean Quarantine Station, Werribee Mansion, Old Melbourne Gaol, National Gallery of Victoria, and Williamstown Maritime Museum. But the stand-out was a music-themed bus-trip with a very fun Silent Disco at Caulfield RSL Sub-Branch! We had an informative afternoon tea on Dying to Know Day, a workshop on 'Protecting Yourself from Scams', regular outings to HMAS Cerberus for Soundwaves Concerts, as well as trips as far afield as Wandin, Nar Nar Goon, Gippsland, and Seymour.














Age Strong Exercise Classes

Honouring our Veterans

WWII Medallions for WWII Veterans

In July, Club President Kevin Hillier OAM was honoured to have presented a 'Commemorative Medallion and Certificate of Commemoration' to eight WWII veterans, in honour of their service and who reside at Vasey RSL Care Frankston South.

The medallion and certificate of commemoration, produced by the Department of Veterans' Affairs, acknowledges the significance of the 75th anniversary of the end of the Second World War.

The medallion and certificate were made available to every living veteran of the second World War.

While Australia can never repay the debt we owe almost one

million Australians who served, this medallion and certificate are a small but meaningful way we can thank living veterans of the largest global conflict of the 20th century.

The obverse design will feature the Commonwealth Coat of Arms, wording of appreciation, and identify by name theatres of war that saw the significant involvement of Australian Armed Forces. The medallion reverse design utilises the poppy as the central symbol surrounded by the wording of 'Australia Remembers', and the beginning and end years of the Second World War.

SPOTLIGHT ON VOLUNTEERS: In the relentless pursuit of helping others.

Anthony Grice – or as we like to call him. 'The Quiet Achiever', is never in the limelight but is always the first to put his hand up and help out. Anthony is the most selfless individual you will ever meet and one who achieves much, but never boasts about it!

Anthony has been a Committee Member and Wellbeing Advocate for five years, 51 years as an RSL service member, and 22 years as a volunteer, including two years as an Appeals Officer.

In November 2023, Anthony was inducted in the RSL Victoria Hall of Fame, having being recognised for his

outstanding effort and significant contribution to the RSL network and the veteran community, and most of all for his commendable dedication to the community and the significant wellbeing support he provides veterans.

Anthony is a qualified Wellbeing Officer and Senior Wellbeing Advocate, as well as a Wellbeing Mentor and has mentored three Wellbeing Trainees, in addition to managing the team of volunteers that repurpose mobility aids, white goods, and furniture, for veterans in need - not only in Frankston, but across the RSL network of sub-branches. Through this program, Anthony has been instrumental in repurposing an estimated value of \$170,000 in goods collected over the past seven years to veterans in need. On any day of the week, and including most weekends, Anthony is out and about collecting donated items to repurpose and allocate to veterans. He goes out of his way to cheer up the day of any veteran or a war widow, and is fulfilled in the knowledge that he has helped provide some simple household comforts that we take for granted, such as a kitchen table and chairs, or a working washing machine and TV.



Anthony continually commits time and effort to other volunteer activities such as hosting the Wednesday Coffee Club at the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch and that began with five attendees pre-COVID19 and has now grown to a weekly coffee club of approximately 25 veterans and their partners who get together for some great chats and social connection.

So where did this passion for helping start? After completing two years of service in the Australian Army (NSS) National Service, including a 12-month tour of duty in Vietnam and where he was far away from family and friends during his 12-month deployment for National Service, the RSL made a lasting and life-changing impression on Anthony Grice.

It all started when Anthony, along with other service men and women, appeared in a 1970 Christmas video message, which aired on television. At the time, his father was on a merchant ship in Victorian waters with limited reception and after a call with his Anthony, the officers stood up and saluted him - this was the defining moment for Anthony. Once the ship docked at Port Kembla, on the New South Wales coast, his father visited the local RSL where he was a member. He happened to mention his son, and every week thereafter, that RSL manager sent Anthony half a dozen beers to Vietnam! It wasn't so much about the beer, it was about what the RSL was doing for their members.

Settling back into civilian life had its challenges. The little-known world of mental health difficulties wreaked havoc on Anthony for a while. PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder) wasn't discussed like it is today. With support from his father, who had served in World War II, led him to a 35 year career in the Merchant Navy like his father, and to supporting veterans through the RSL.

Never far from his mind was the vow he made to give back to veteran services once he retired. Anthony became a member at Frankston RSL Sub-Branch in 2001 and a few years later joined the Committee. The rest, as they say, is history.

Anthony served as the Appeals Officer for both the ANZAC and Poppy Appeals in 2018 and 2019, and helped raised \$233,500.

Anthony also commits significant hours to the Age Strong Exercise group held weekly at the club ensuring older members remain physically and mentally strong and as a means of eradicating social isolation.

Many know him as the Welfare Officer – a role that he finds immensely rewarding and priceless in its quest to help others. "We took out an electric wheelchair to a war widow…the smile on her face, that did it for me, that was good enough", said Anthony.

During the challenging times of COVID19, Anthony's ingenuity paid off, finding ways to work around tight restrictions to continue the RSL's welfare work. "You had to think, how can we think outside the square to do things?", and he certainly did. From leaving groceries at front doors, to making calls, and assisting members from the RSL Hello Program. "The prime objective was that we there there to help", says Anthony. His passion, dedication, and exemplary performance in supporting the veteran community reflects great credit on him and the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch. It is volunteers like Anthony that form the

Anthony won the 2016 Volunteer of the Year Award an award he is immensely proud of.

He has also helped in the running of the 'Volunteers Week Luncheon' held yearly at the club. According to Anthony, "Volunteers are the backbone of any RSL and without them, the RSL would find it hard to do the work that it does, from the Appeals and Wellbeing and Compensation cases, to visiting veterans and war widows in care. In 2021, RSL Victoria had approximately 16,000 Volunteers each of whom, if they'd volunteered at a token value of \$41 an hour, would have equated to \$10.8m in volunteer support to veterans.





















COMMUNITY SUPPORT FUND

The Frankston RSL Sub-Branch is committed to supporting the local community and currently provides funding to a vast array of local sporting groups, charities, community organisations, and not-for-profits.



The Frankston RSL Sub-Branch is proud to support Mums Supporting Families in Need (MSFIN). The organisation was born out of the idea that as a community, we can ensure no family is living without their basic daily needs, and that no child should go without essentials.

The organisation's busiest time of year is around December, and our financial donation goes a long way to helping our community's most vulnerable families. Locally based in Seaford, the organisation helps local families in need with gently used or brand-new clothing or footwear for babies through to seniors, as well as baby essentials, toiletries, food, and linen.

In 2024 they provided material aid to over 430 families. According to Charlotte Davies, Strategy and Fundraising Manager, "With the cost of living soaring and the known increase in family violence. more families than ever are relying 10am to 2.30pm. on our support."

The Winter Shelter provide 12 weeks of care during the winter months of June, July and August, to people who find themselves homeless at this difficult time of year. The Shelter provides overnight accommodation, warm dinner, a hot shower, and breakfast for the guests. According to FWS Committee Member, Jennifer Abreu. "160 volunteers from six Frankston churches enable this program, running from Peninsula City Church three nights per week and from St Anne's Seaford for two nights per week. Once the Shelter finishes, unfortunately the guests return to sleeping rough. The Shelter provides good quality, extreme weather



SPOTLIGHT ON VOLUNTEERS: Taking the Appeals to the next level!

Peter Kerley- better known as 'The Appeals Guru', has been instrumental in growing and running our ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day Appeals since 2020.

Peter has also been a member of the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch Committee since October 2020, and even tried retiring from his role as committee member in 2023, but couldn't stay away - and six months later put up his hand and came back to take on the onerous role of Committee Secretary, when the elected Secretary had to step down. He also served as Vice President, Treasurer, and Committee Secretary at Seaford RSL Sub-Branch, prior to joining Frankston RSL Sub-Branch. Peter has been a crucial resource during the appeals season and his drive to raise funds for veterans and their families is second to none.

His extraordinary commitment and dedication is proven by the impressive results he has achieved, in conjunction with the Appeals Teams, since taking on the appeals coordination volunteer role at the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch in 2020. Peter has helped raise consecutive recordbreaking funds, never experienced before at the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch, of more than \$608,000 - for both ANZAC Day and Poppy Appeals. He has also conducted an Appeals 'Train-the-Trainer' seminar at RSL Victoria HQ for 45 Sub-Branch representatives, as well as an Appeals Forum at the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch, as a volunteer drive.

Peter has been instrumental in getting the Appeals back to normal post COVID19. His admirable efforts include rallying volunteers, devoting countless hours working appeals stalls, through to his crucial efforts in planning and managing the appeals process - a 12 month ongoing job for just four weeks of actual selling of pins, involving sourcing merchandise, distributing material to vendors, negotiating with retail outlets for 'free' floor space for stalls, to working with 130 businesses, aged care facilities, community organisations, and schools, to set up appeals boxes and merchandise at each of these premises. Peter has also made improvements to the appeals process, thanks to his business background, introducing EFTPOS payments and training volunteers to operate the machines.

The hours of work that go behind the scenes throughout the year in setting up and rolling out both the ANZAC and Poppy Appeals is arduous, but you never hear one word of complaint from Peter - a request for a cup of tea with a slice of lemon is all he asks for. When not on the Golf course, Peter spends the rest of his time at committee meetings and managing Committee Secretary duties, as are older or younger, because our veterans well as veteran wellbeing activities.

The volunteer task of Committee Secretary in a Sub-Branch such as ours, requires discipline, attention to detail, and a lot of hard always someone who can talk to them and work. Thanks to Peter, the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch maintains an impeccable record in compliance and corporate governance, with RSL Victoria, ACNC, CAV, and the VGCCC.





So where did this passion for helping veterans start? Peter is a veteran himself, and served with 7th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment from 8th April 1967 to 18th March 1968, serving 346 days in Vietnam, and ending his service as Section Commander, Lance-Corporal.





When returning to civilian life he had a successful career working for Multi-Nationals as a Sales & Marketing Director and it's this experience and expertise that he uses with each new ANZAC and Poppy Appeal to ensure it's even more successful than the last. Peter is determined to help any way he can raise funds for veterans and his determination is fuelled by the knowledge that the benefits of his fundraising efforts contribute to veteran wellbeing programs and activities, that do wondrous work in helping beat social isolation amongst our veteran community, as well as help their families who find themselves in necessitous circumstances. Part of the funds raised by the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch Appeals are also re-distributed to help veterans from smaller RSL Sub-Branches in the region who have limited fundraising resources.

When recently asked what keeps him going, he answered, "We want to make sure that all our veterans are going along okay and are looked after - it's the core purpose of every RSL Branch. We never forget why we are here. The human connection is what the RSL is all about, and we exist to look after veterans and their families, whether they are getting much younger these days and serving in places such as Afghanistan. It's important that veterans know that there's look after them at any time, and we take great pride in that at the RSL".

With an international business background, Peter has been a sounding board for General Manager Brett Rowlands, and his hard work is invaluable in the continued success of the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch, in addition to his fundraising efforts to raise funds for veterans.

Peter volunteers with the club in any way he can, from travelling to Canberra to hand deliver a donated tin of 80-year-old WWI biscuits to the Canberra War Memorial, to holding the Karingal Hub Remembrance Day Service for five years now. He says that what encourages him to do the Commemorative service every year at Karingal is the heartening feeling to see the turn-up of shoppers at the centre and the reverence they have for our departed.

AUSTRALIA'S WOMEN DURING WW

Service, Courage, Care



Britain declared war on Germany in September 1939 after Nazi Germany invaded Poland; Australia and other allies also declared war. What followed was six years of conflict with Australians involved in battle fronts as close as Papua New Guinea

and as far away as the North Atlantic. Many Australian women saw a need to participate in the Second World War in any way they could with many of them involved in what had traditionally been male only occupations. Women at home faced new challenges; some of these challenges meant changes for Australian women that continued after WWII.

Service roles for Australian women

The Second World War saw new opportunities for Australian women to make contributions to Australia's war efforts. Traditional roles like nursing still existed, however the creation of volunteer organisations meant that women could take up a greater range of jobs and responsibilities related to the war.

Some of these organisations were associated with Australia's armed forces, they were known as auxiliary services, which meant that they were additional to, but not part of, Australia's Army, Navy and Air Force.





Women in these auxiliary forces were able to take on roles that might have otherwise required men. In this way, the men were able to move into roles directly related to the areas of conflict. This was significant for Australia's war effort, as it meant that essential jobs across the country could continue while Australian men were overseas fighting the enemy forces or in Australia in military defence roles.

Other jobs for women



Australian women moved into a large range of specific jobs during WW11. These jobs contributed to Australia's defence, the jobs allowed our nation to keep our forces properly equipped and effective as the troops fought overseas. Many of the jobs involved



women taking on new skills and being trained in a range of military technologies and methods. Some of these technologies and methods were relatively new, so many women found themselves at the "cutting edge" of scientific and industrial developments.



Australian women were also faced with the challenge of how to react to the US servicemen and their different ways of life.

The home front also brought other changes; Autralia's role in WWII meant that people at home had to consider how they could help the war effort and Australian women were often faced with impactful decisions affecting themselves and their families.

SPOTLIGHT ON VOLUNTEERS: 40 years of volunteerism &dedication to the community!

Carol Macfarlane - has had a wonderful career volunteering at the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch and for the local community. Affectionately known as 'Cas', Carol has been a member of the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch for 40 years and she's a true volunteer in every sense of the word since the 1980's. Her involvement in volunteering was not born through a connection to the armed services, but purely for the love of volunteering.

So what makes this volunteer tick? She is a mother of two, with multiple grandchildren, has the wittiest of characters, and doesn't let anything phase her. Carol isn't shy in putting up her hand and helping out, and her 40 years as a volunteer is a testament of her commitment to Community Work and the RSL.

Born in Edinburgh, Scotland in nineteen hundred and something, Carol grew up with brothers, went to school in Edinburgh, and then to Secretarial College at 16. After obtaining her Diploma she was employed by a large engineering firm as a junior shorthand typist, earning the princely sum of three pounds two and six!!!

Carol married an Australian with Scottish parents in 1965, before coming to Australia in 1968. Carol was a stay-at-home mum with two sons, until they went to kinder. Their newly built home in Karingal did not have carpets, and she was desperate to get floor covering, so back to work she went.

Carol worked at Golden Poultry (Inghams) for 10 years as PA to the General Manager, followed by a further eight years at Pilkington Australia as PA to the Plant Manager.

Her connection with the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch began in the late 70's when Carol and her family first started coming to the club for good old wholesome family entertainment - as many people did during this era. "Friday night was the best", recalls Carol. "We would come home from work, quickly get changed, and off we would go the local RSL where we would have a meal and a dance. The Frankston RSL was smaller back then, but their Friday night Dinner Dance was always thriving, and you'd be hard pressed to find a seat or a car park."

On retirement she found herself at a loss. She moved to Coffs Harbour and enjoyed the tropical life for a while, and it was during her time in Coffs that she gingerly began volunteering, joining the Community Centre as a volunteer as well as running the local Lifeline Op Shop. She loved those two jobs, and they certainly kept her busy which is how Carol loves to spend her days. Her sons got married, then of course along came the grandchildren and Carol didn't want to be so far away from them, so they sold up and exchanged the tropical life, for 'sunny' Melbourne, and settled on Frankston.

They bought a house in Lee Street, just around the corner from the club and joined the Frankston RSL Bowls Club from 2007-2016, and she became the first female Secretary of the Men's Division, and after amalgamation she stayed on as Secretary. It was a sad day when the Bowls Club ceased to exist, it had become her life and she asked herself once again, "What can I do now?"

In true Carol style, she joined the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch Home & Hospital Visitation Volunteer Group, but that didn't take up too much of her time, so she tried the Ladies Auxiliary, but didn't think that was for her. Little did she know how things would pan out in a few years to come.

"I became a volunteer Flower Lady at Peninsula Private Hospital and did that for several years. I then joined Wesley Do-Care Organisation where we visited or took out a group of socially isolated people. I enjoyed this work and met some lovely people".

"I do like to volunteer, so I gave the Ladies Auxiliary another try in 2014, and much to my surprise, I found I liked it much better the second time round, and I've now been a member for 10 years. After a while I was elected to the Ladies Auxiliary Committee and enjoyed being involved in the running of this group", remembers Carol fondly.

"I felt I could be doing more to help veterans, so I asked our then President, Brent Clyne if there was more that I could do to help. He then organised for me to become a Trainee Welfare Advocate".













"The Committee and staff at Frankston RSL Sub-Branch are a great team and I have enjoyed working with most of them over the years. I always feel welcome at the venue, and for me it's a bonus being able to help veterans. Thank you for giving me the opportunity to help".

Spotlight on volunteers: continued

This was a huge undertaking for Carol as she didn't have any military background, and the work involved was quite overwhelming. Anthony Grice, fellow Frankston RSL Sub-Branch Wellbeing Advocate was her Mentor, and he showed great patience, and she kept at it! "It was a great feeling to pass Level 1 of the DVA accredited course to qualify as a Welfare Officer. I had achieved something!!!", says Carol with her characteristic wry smile. "COVID19 interrupted some of my studies, but we persevered and managed to help a few veterans, and I spent quite some time delivering toilet paper rolls to veterans. It's hard to believe now how empty the supermarkets were, especially for toilet paper, baked beans, rice and pasta!" A year later, on 1st December 2021, Carol achieved her qualification of 'Military Wellbeing Advocate Level 2', and was delighted at this additional achievement. Just another volunteerism notch under her belt.

"At that time, the Ladies Auxiliary Group was in serious trouble - membership numbers were dwindling, and it became difficult to form a committee. ANZAC House Women's Council suggested we become the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch Ladies Auxiliary Friendship Group - no committee required, so I was elected the Group Coordinator and have been happily doing that for the last couple of years and thriving back to recovery after a recent illness."

Carol's volunteerism doesn't end there! She also chairs the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch Home & Hospital Visitation Team and has been a member for 18 years, attending monthly volunteer meetings and visits veterans and their partners in Nursing Homes in the Frankston, Tyabb, and Somerville area, as well as some people living in their own home. The group goes equipped with a bag of chocolates and provide support, as well as a smile, and much needed social contact. It's this selfless dedication to combatting social isolation among veterans and their partners or widows that makes the program a huge success. Around this time of year Carol also helps pack approximately 300 Christmas parcels and hampers full of sweet and savoury festive treats to distribute to residents at the various nursing homes regularly visited by the team. This year the group is also prepared over 100 Hampers for 'Independent Living' Residents at Vasey RSL Care Frankston South (RSL Park).

Carol also volunteers at the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch every Friday night, helping sell community raffle tickets during Friday Night Raffles, as well as catching up with some of the other Auxiliary Ladies. "I love to be able to help the RSL and hope I can continue to do so for a few more years - and any ladies interested in joining the Auxiliary would be made most welcome".

The Ladies Auxiliary are avid fundraisers and throughout the year run various fundraisers, including raffling off Easter and Christmas hampers. All funds raised get pooled and divided out annually to several charities and not-for-profits or community groups that the Auxiliary selects annually. The Ladies Auxiliary also run a fundraiser raffle of their own during the club Friday night raffles, selling raffle tickets for \$1 to win a weekly \$50 Gift Card. More often than not, tickets run out and there's still a queue of people wanting to buy a raffle ticket. Carol thrives in her tireless fundraising work and being able to give back to the community, charities, and veterans and their families.

The Auxiliary members selflessly dedicate hours of work to help those less fortunate, and according to Carol, "The joy is in the giving and it's more worthwhile when it goes to such life changing organisations such as 'Mums Supporting Families in Need Inc', 'Backpack4VicKids', 'GameChanger', or 'Theodora's Cheerful Givers', to list a few that we've helped". In 2024, the Women's Auxiliary raised an impressive \$13,813!

The Ladies Auxiliary

The Ladies Auxiliary enjoyed a successful 2024, raising \$13,813 and our membership further increasing to a total of 27 ladies. The ladies continue to enjoy each other's company, and our customary weekly Friday night meetups at the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch are a lot of fun and a wonderful opportunity to socialise.

We had another very successful Easter and Christmas Raffle, both of which did very well judging by ticket sales - namely the Christmas Raffle raising \$3000. Once again the Frankston RSL Sub-Branch kindly donated three Good Guys Gift Cards amounting to \$1000, (\$500, \$300, \$200) to go toward the hamper prizes, ensuring the fundraiser was a huge success which enabled us to donate to various organisations that support and help veterans in need.

Our Friday Night \$1 raffles tracked well throughout the year and readily sold out every Friday. During the monthly Mega Raffles nights, we consistently sell-out of four sets of raffle books, and there are still not enough tickets to go round to all patrons wanting to buy a ticket!

To this effect, in 2024, we allocated approximately \$5000 in donations, with our primary donations going to Community Services Frankston that support those who are experiencing financial hardship in the Frankston area. Our ladies collect staple goods each month, such as pasta and jars of sauce, tinned goods, toiletries and hygiene products, and more. These staples are then given to Community Services Frankston for distribution. The ladies enjoy collecting these items over the month as they know they are being put to good use.

Additionally, wreaths were laid during Remembrance Day and Vietnam Veterans Day at Frankston War Memorial in Beauty Park, and the Christmas Lunch at the club for veterans and Associated Groups was thoroughly enjoyed by the Auxiliary.

In 2024 we also took part in our first 'Friendship Bus Trip', visiting Phillip Island. This was a great day, and we all enjoyed a delicious lunch at Cowes RSL Sub-Branch. We aim to continue these bus trips throughout 2025 as it re-energises friendships and acquaintances, and brings us closer together as a group.

Our quarterly lunch meetings with the extended Friendship Group of Rosebud, Rye, and Dromana will continue as these lunches keep us connected with other ESOs on the Peninsula.
